

What's in the shed?

Your membership gives you access to the WAHGA trading sheds. The two sheds are on the Maidenhead Road allotment site next to 185 Maidenhead Road, and on the Fairground allotment site next to Gardeners Hall at 213 St Leonards Road, Both are open on Sundays and Thursdays (for opening times see the website or your membership card). Staffed by volunteers, the sheds are stocked with various products, including bird seed, composts, fertilizers, pesticides, canes, netting, fleece and black plastic at competitive prices. Seed potatoes, onion sets, vegetable seeds and flower bulbs are available in the appropriate season. Dobies supplies the seeds, which are sold at up to a 50% discount on list price. A list of the seeds available at the sheds is on the Association's website.

Maidenhead Road site update

The winter has been hard for all of us, so as we haven't been able

to get on our own plots a few of us have been clearing recently vacated allotments. It is incredible how much 'stuff' is left behind, including a fridge, plastic bags, beer bottles, window

frames, shoes, scrap metal and carpet. At one time carpet was recommended as a weed suppressant, but it needs to be lifted before weeds grow through otherwise it becomes a permanent fixture. We don't want carpet left on plots, please folks!

Some of the apple and pear trees have been tidied up, as they were becoming too tall. One tree was rotten to the core, with the potential of causing harm to anyone nearby. These trees should now bear bigger and better fruit, so we can all benefit. At the end of January, a hole was cut through the fence separating the Glebe from the cemetery, allowing thieves to enter, break into ten sheds and steal machinery. If you were one of unfortunate victims, report the matter to the police if you haven't done so already.

The rubbish that had gathered

outside the container has been removed. Our friendly neighbour has made some comments about damage to their fence, so let's all try to keep things tidy. We collect scrap metal from the plots, which you will see in a pile behind the toilet block. It is collected regularly and profits go to Thames Valley Hospice. The car parking area is in the process of being extended. The east end has begun to be cleared and hopefully, by the spring, it will have been levelled. We are concerned about security, so can you please make sure that the gates are locked when you leave. Don't rely on someone else to do it, as they will be doing the same! Finally, don't forget to come and chat to us. We are nearly always about during the day.

Q How do I know if I have club root and what can I do about it?

A Signs are the wilting of plants even when the soil is moist, and knobbly growths on the roots. Club root is a soil-borne fungus and cannot be got rid of. It can be suppressed by planting out larger plants from pots, adding lime to the plot (or the planting hole a few weeks before planting), feeding with calcium cyanamide (sold as Perlka) or growing resistant varieties such as Kilaxy, Kilaton (cabbage), Lodero (red cabbage), Crispus (Brussels sprouts), Clapton (cauliflower) and Monciano (calabrese).
